LATEST UPDATES

TGA approves COVID-19 vaccine booster doses

On 27 October 2021 the <u>Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) provisionally approved a booster</u> dose of the Comirnaty (Pfizer) COVID-19 vaccine for individuals 18 years and older.

Booster doses will be free for everyone in Australia aged 18 years and over. This includes people without a Medicare card, overseas visitors, international students, migrant workers and asylum seekers.

Further advice on the use of boosters will be provided to government shortly by the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI).

When the ATAGI advice is received, the Department of Health will be developing in-language communication resources with information about booster doses. These resources will be shared with stakeholders as soon as they are available. The translated resources will also be published on the Department of Health website.





LATEST UPDATES

To the COVID-19 vaccine rollout

The Australian Technical Advisory Group (ATAGI) announced a <u>3rd primary dose of COVID-19 vaccine</u> for individuals who are severely immunocompromised on 7 October 2021.

Everyone in Australia aged 12 years and over are eligible for a COVID-19 vaccine. People aged 60 years and over are now able to receive the mRNA vaccines, vaccines Comirnaty (Pfizer) and Spikevax (Moderna).

The First Thing's First advertising campaign encourages people to get vaccinated. Campaign materials including video, radio and poster are available in this pack.



KEY MESSAGES

COVID-19 vaccines

- COVID-19 vaccines are available and free for everyone in Australia, even if they don't have a Medicare card.
- We need the vaccine to help end the pandemic, reduce the number of cases, and stop the virus from changing.
- COVID-19 vaccines can help us get back to doing the things we enjoy.
- People aged 60 and over can now access the mRNA COVID-19 vaccines Comirnaty (Pfizer) and Spikevax (Moderna).
- Everyone aged 12 years and over is recommended to get vaccinated against COVID-19.
- It is important for pregnant women to get vaccinated. The risk of serious outcomes from COVID-19 is higher for pregnant women and their unborn baby.
- Proof of vaccination is available with your COVID-19 vaccination immunisation history statement or COVID-19 digital certificate.

- It is important to stay informed about COVID-19 updates through official sources.
- If you want to talk to someone about COVID-19 vaccine, call the National Coronavirus Helpline on **1800 020 080**. The hotline is available 24 hours, 7 days a week. For phone interpreting services, call **131 450**, and ask to be connected with the help line.
- If you need in-language support to book your COVID-19 vaccine appointment, you can call 131 450 for interpreting services.










