Purpose of this toolkit



This toolkit includes information and background FAQs about the NSW single-use plastic ban that starts with a ban on lightweight plastic bags (35 microns thick or less) on 1 June 2022, followed by a number of other single use plastic bans on 1 November 2022.

The NSW Government is running an awareness campaign 'Stop it and Swap it' and we would love it if you could promote these changes too. The campaign page is available <u>here</u>.

The facts



- From 1 June 2022 lightweight plastic bags of 35 microns thick or less (including compostable and bioplastic alternatives) will be banned in NSW.
- From 1 November 2022 more bans will come in, covering single-use plastic straws, stirrers, cutlery, plates, bowls and cotton buds, expanded polystyrene food ware and cups, and rinse-off personal care products containing plastic microbeads.
- The bans follow the *Plastic Reduction and Circular Economy Act 2021* passed in November 2021.
- Single-use plastic items and packaging make up 60% of all litter in NSW.
- The NSW single-use plastic ban will prevent almost 2.7 billion items of plastic litter from entering the environment in NSW over the next 20 years.
- The NSW Government has engaged the National Retailers Association to deliver a comprehensive retailer education and awareness campaign about the bans.
- The NSW Government is also running a consumer awareness and education campaign: Stop it and Swap it.

What is banned?



The NSW Government is banning certain single use plastic items in 2 stages during 2022.



Exemptions will apply in certain settings to allow the supply of single-use plastic straws to people with a disability or medical need.

The ban also applies to single-use plastic cotton buds and microbeads in certain rinse-off personal care products.

Lightweight plastic shopping bags a thing of the past

Remember to pack your reusable shopping bags when you go to the shops as lightweight plastic shopping bags are now a thing of the past in NSW (as of 1 June 2022).

The state's ban on the highly littered item is the first in a series of singleuse plastic phase-outs that will see a number of other items added to the list.

A second ban from 1 November this year will include single-use plastic straws, stirrers, cutlery, plates, bowls and cotton buds, expanded polystyrene food ware and cups, and rinse-off personal care products containing plastic microbeads.

Single-use plastic items and packaging make up 60% of all litter in NSW.

These plastic bans will prevent almost 2.7 billion items of plastic litter entering our environment in NSW over the next 20 years.

At XX* we encourage you to use either cloth or tote bags as a great alternative to the now banned lightweight shopping bags.

Lightweight plastic shopping bags now banned

Lightweight plastic shopping bags are now banned in NSW as of 1 June 2022.

A cloth or a tote bag is a great alternative, so remember to take your reusable shopping bags with you next time you visit the shops.

The NSW Government ban is the first in a series of single use plastic phaseouts.

From 1 November these items will also be banned: single-use plastic straws, stirrers, cutlery, plates, bowls and cotton buds, expanded polystyrene food ware and cups, and rinse-off personal care products containing plastic microbeads.

Single-use plastic items and packaging make up 60% of all litter in NSW.

These plastic bans will prevent almost 2.7 billion items of plastic litter entering the NSW environment over the next 20 years.

Banned and not banned	
What plastic bags are banned from 1 June 2022?	 Lightweight plastic bags (35 microns or less) including compostable and bioplastic alternatives.
What plastic bags are <i>not</i> banned from 1 June 2022?	 Plastic bags thicker than 35 microns (found in some supermarkets and boutique stores). Barrier bags – bin liners, vegie/produce bags, nappy bags, pet-waste bags.
Are other single-use plastics banned from 1 June 2022?	 No, only lightweight plastic bags (35 microns or less) are banned from 1 June 2022. More items will be banned from 1 November – these include single-use plastic straws, stirrers, and cutlery including forks, spoons, knives, sporks, chopsticks, plastic plates and bowls, also polystyrene food service items such as clamshells and cups.
1 November 2022 ban	
What plastic items are banned from 1 November that I need to get ready for?	From 1 November 2022, the following items will be banned including their compostable and biodegradable alternatives: Plastic single use cutlery (spoons, knives, forks, sporks, chopsticks – any utensil used for consuming food) Plastic single use plates and bowls (excludes bowls with a spill proof lid whether separate or attached) Plastic single use stirrers Plastic single use straws (with exemptions for people with a disability or other medical need) Plastic single use cotton buds and plastic microbeads in rinse off personal hygiene products Expanded polystyrene foodware including bowls, cups, clamshell containers and plates. Includes any plastic item made in whole or in part of expanded polystyrene used to serve food or beverages



Compostable and bio plastics	
Are compostable items included in the bans?	 Yes – The bans on problematic and single-use plastic items apply even if these items are made from biodegradable, compostable, or bio-plastics. This includes those made from Australian certified compostable plastic. These so-called alternatives do not biodegrade unless they are specially treated in an industrial composting facility, creating just as much of a problem as conventional plastics.
Who does the ban apply to	
Who does the ban apply to?	 A person must not supply a banned item in NSW while carrying on a business or activity including: Retail or hospitality businesses such as restaurants, cafes, bars, hotels, takeaway food outlets, party supply stores, discount stores, supermarkets, market stalls, online stores, and any other commercial business Manufacturers, suppliers, distributors and wholesalers supplying the banned items in NSW – penalties doubled for this sector Anyone undertaking an activity for charitable, sporting, education or community purposes for example, a community group, charity, government body, not-for-profit organisation, education provider, sporting group or religious body supplying banned items as part of a meal service or during fundraising events. Businesses (such as distribution centres and online stores) can supply a banned item to a person outside NSW, but we recommend checking for similar bans in other jurisdictions.
Reporting plastic use	
Where can I make a report if a business is still using lightweight plastic bags?	 Reports can be made through the Enviroline by calling 131 555 or info@epa.nsw.gov.au A Report to EPA application will be made available through the EPA website for citizens to report supply of prohibited plastic items: www.epa.nsw.gov.au



Existing stock	
What can I do with existing banned stock/ is there going to be a buyback of existing stock/?	 Businesses should speak to their suppliers if they have large amounts of stock. Suppliers may accept returns or exchanges. Businesses can also seek to transfer existing stock to a local recycler or another state (noting similar possible plastic bans in other jurisdictions). The EPA will not be purchasing existing stock of prohibited items, however small businesses can register with the NSW EPA for help to recycle existing banned lightweight plastic bag stock by filling out this <u>form</u>.
Council and other stakeholder events	
Are Councils responsible for ensuring compliance at events?	 The EPA is the sole regulator and will monitor and enforce the bans. Local Government will not be responsible for actively monitoring compliance and enforcement of the bans at events. However, public authorities including councils, must ensure they don't supply any of the prohibited items, as this is an offence and fines may apply. This includes offering to supply the items or making the items available.
What alternatives can be used at events?	 Where possible, we encourage you to move to reusable alternatives. If you decide you still need disposable items, talk to your suppliers about alternative options that are not prohibited such as paper, wood or bamboo. Keep in mind that the bans on problematic and single-use plastic items apply even if these items are made from biodegradable, compostable, or bio-plastics. This includes those made from Australian certified compostable plastic.



Enforcement	
How will the ban be enforced?	 The NSW Government will be focusing on education, awareness and information in the first instance to encourage compliance and behaviour change. The NSW Government is working with businesses and organisation to ensure they understand their obligations and has engaged the National Retailers Association to deliver a comprehensive retailer education and awareness campaign about the ban. The EPA is the sole regulator and will monitor and enforce the ban and will be responsible for enforcing the Plastic Reduction and Circular Economy Act 2021. The Act provides a broad range of enforcement tools including the ability to issue penalty notices, prosecute for offences and to issue compliance notices to suppliers or occupiers.
What are the penalties?	 The NSW Government will be focusing on education, awareness and information in the first instance to encourage compliance and behaviour change. On the spot fines (penalty notices) for retailers and other businesses supplying lightweight plastic bags are \$1,100 for individuals and \$5,500 for corporations. If the business is a manufacturer, producer, wholesaler or distributor of the prohibited item the fines are \$2,750 for individuals or \$13,750 for corporations. Significantly higher penalties apply if a matter goes to court, with fines for retailers and other businesses of up to a maximum of \$11,000 for individuals and \$55,000 for corporations. If people persist in handing out lightweight plastic bags after the EPA has issued them a notice to stop supply (a stop notice), the court can impose fines of up to \$55,000 for an individual (plus an additional \$5,500 for every day the individual persists in handing out lightweight plastic bags) and \$275,000 for a corporation (plus an additional \$27,500 for every day the corporation persists in handing out lightweight plastic bags). Court imposed penalties are doubled for manufacturers, wholesalers, distributors or suppliers of lightweight plastic bags.
