RATES AND CHARGES This includes all ordinary rates, the Catchments Remediation Rate, Hornsby Quarry loan rate and garbage charges.

FEES AND CHARGES This includes fees from Development Applications and revenue earned from aquatic centres, nurseries and preschools, commercial waste services, park and oval hire and property rentals

INTEREST Investment income received from Council's investment portfolio, overdue rates and annual charge interest

GRANTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS This includes development contributions, the Federal Government's Financial Assistance Grant and numerous smaller amounts from governments for services including preschools, bushfire mitigation, children's services, various community services, libraries, roads, various environmental grants and pensioner rate subsidy.

EXTERNAL LOANS The amount of funds borrowed from a financial institution.

ASSET SALES Proceeds from the sale of property, plant or equipment.

RESTRICTED ASSETS Funds set aside in prior years for specific expenditure purposes in future years.

OTHER This includes many revenue sources such as fines, recycling income, private vehicle use fees and income from road closures. Depreciation Contra has been included in this category.

EMPLOYEE EXPENSE This includes salaries and wages, leave entitlements, travel expenses, superannuation, workers compensation insurance, fringe benefits tax and training.

INTERNAL COSTS AND
DEPRECIATION Internal costs are
initially recorded as various operating
costs and subsequently recharged
elsewhere as operating or capital
expenditure in order to determine the
full cost.

MATERIALS AND
CONTRACTS This includes all costs, other than employee costs, associated with the maintenance of parks, roads, buildings, nurseries and preschools, aquatic centres, drainage and the cost of waste services. Also included are environmental protection and plant operating

OTHER These reflect Council's diverse operations and include such items as rentals, interest charges, consultants, contributions to Fire Brigade Services, street lighting, office equipment, legals, insurance, advertising, telephones and cash collection charges.

- Bioretention system (stormwater garden) at Mount Kuring-gai completed, improving the health of Cowan Creek
- Foreshore revegetation work at Brooklyn Park, McKell Park, Kangaroo Point, Singleton Road, Seymours Park, Sams Creek, Bar Island and Crosslands completed

- Solar systems installed on the Council Administration Building and Hornsby Library
- Heating, ventilation and air conditioning predictive maintenance trial with CSIRO at Hornsby, Berowra, Galston, Pennant Hills and Epping Libraries commenced
- Energy Meter Trial commenced providing three energy meters for loan to residents from Council's libraries
- Decrease in water pollution in Larool Creek, Thornleigh, following local industry education campaign

DEVELOPMENT AND TOWN PLANNING SERVICES

In February 2011, the
Department of Planning released
its annual Local Development
Performance Monitoring Report
(2009/10). The report provides
an overview of local and regional
development determined
by councils, private certifiers
and Joint Regional Planning
Panels, and indications of the
performance of the planning
system.

Councils are grouped into one of eleven council types or groups based on population, size, location and development. Grouping councils according to similar socioeconomic characteristics allows comparison between councils' results and the performance of like councils. Hornsby is in 'Group 7' together with: Blue Mountains, Campbelltown, Gosford, Liverpool, Penrith, The Hills and Wyong Councils.

The following table sets out Council's performance against 'Group 7' councils in 2009/10 and against Council's result in 2008/09.

KANGAROO POINT

In December, an amendment to the Hornsby Shire Local Environmental Plan 1994 was gazetted permitting construction of a commuter berthing facility at Kangaroo Point, Brooklyn.

Council, in partnership with the Roads and Traffic Authority, prepared a study to determine the feasibility of a path to link the communities in Brooklyn with a shared path between Kangaroo Point and Parsley Bay. Community input was sought up to early June.
